About the Show

he Royal School is set in the 1840s in the short-lived school for the children of ali'i. Meet young Lydia, Lot, Pauahi, Alexander, and Moses-- future kings, queens, and leaders of Hawai'i. The show features original music, mele, and rap in a modern re-telling of one of the most important historical moments in the kingdom of Hawai'i.

Note from Co-Creator, Lee Cataluna

Today's children are told that things are changing too fast for adults to figure out. They are warned that it's their responsibility to shape the future. They feel the weight of that responsibility.

The children of Hawaiian chiefs in the mid-1800s were similar in this way. They were called "children of the turning tide" and "the hope of their people" and upon their shoulders was placed the future of Hawaii. The sixteen royal children educated at Ke Kula Keiki Ali`i, the Royal School, were being educated to deal with things their parents and grandparents didn't know how to fix: the increasing economic and political pressures of globalization, the loss of indigenous culture, and a rapidly changing set of national values.

The creative team on this project worked to keep the story from the point of view of the royal children - - some of whom entered the boarding school when they were four years old - - rather than from the perspective of their missionary teachers or from the distant gaze of historians. In this play, the childhood voices of Hawaii's kings and queens transcend time and speak to the children of today, the future leaders of Hawaii.



About the Cast



Moses Goods (Co-Creator/ Moses) is one of Hawai'i's most prominent theatre artists and an Artistic Associate at Honolulu Theatre for Youth. Originally from the island of Maui and now based in Honolulu, he has traveled nationally and internationally, performing his original work to a wide range of audiences. His body of work ranges from full length plays to theat-rical storytelling pieces most of which are strongly rooted in Native Hawaiian culture.



Alysia-Leila Kepa'a (Lydia) was born and raised in Nānākuli, Oʻahu. She is making her HTY debut in The Royal School, and is currently working on her Associates degree in Theatre Concentration at WCC. She is excited to be a part of the HTY ensemble.



Annie Lokomaika'i Lipscomb (Pauahi) is a multidisciplinary artist, born and raised in the islands of Hawai'i. With a background in hula, performance, and creative writing, she has spent years sharing the richness of Hawai'i with communities across the globe.
